







Principal's Message



We give thanks to thee, O God We give thanks We call on thy name and recount Thy wondrous deeds (Pslam: 75:1)

The above words of the psalmist from the Bible spontaneously ring in our hearts and minds as we celebrate Quasquicentennial of our college. We, the Franciscans bow our heads and thank the Almighty for showering his manifold and bountiful blessings upon our institution during its 125 years of existence.

St. Francis' College has reached a milestone in history. It was founded in 1885, envisioned by the founder Principal Rev. Fr. Norbert OFM Cap., an Italian Capuchin priest who planted the seed in the city of Nawabs on the 26th of April that year, hardly expecting that the tiny seed would blossom into a gigantic tree sheltering innumerable students through centuries. The imposing and impressive structure houses about 3000 students and 108 staff members, providing value based wholesome quality education. The yeoman's service rendered by the institution during this time has ensured the rise of educational standards in the city while the college itself has reached glorious heights from a humble beginning. Walking in the footsteps of the founder, through the hallowed portals of the college, 35 Principals in succession have left no stone unturned for its growth and development.

Undoubtedly, times have changed. A student of today lives in an increasingly diverse and globalised community. The recent developments in the field of education, learning process and technology approaches during the last two decades have transformed human life and the world. They have also impacted the instructional process and redefined the concept of learning. Our central government's recent initiatives in the form of grading system with Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation and recommending introduction of three language formula and constitution of a national commission for secondary education etc. designed to reduce stress and to bring India at par with international standards are indeed laudable. It can be safely deduced that education today does not mean measurement of the level of learning outcomes only of the learner but also reflects life skills acquisitions, personality attributes, behaviour, interests, attitudes, values and proficiency in indoor and outdoor co-curricular activities. 

This claim was validated by the fact that St. Francis' College bagged top honours at three major Inter-School Competitions. 




















In the 21st Century, the world is facing a global catastrophe



Scientists have sounded the alarm bells over impending global catastrophe as existing governments and institutions are too powerless to head it off. The world faces a compounding series of crises – from energy, food shortages, climatic change, new diseases and increasing anti-biotic resistance all driven by human activity, which is beyond the capacity of existing institutions to cope with, warms a group of eminent environmental scientists and economists.

Neoliberal globalisation is incapable of resolving the mounting world crisis. The lack of sharing and unequal distribution of the world's natural and energetic resources is at

the heart of this problem. Energy, food and water crises, climatic disruption, declining fisheries, ocean acidification, emerging diseases and increasing antibiotic resistance are examples of serious, intertwined globalscale challenges spawned by accelerating human activities.

Today there is little doubt that climatic change is occurring, and that negative consequences are beginning to emerge. According to a report published by the European Commission, climatic changes already account for around 160,000 deaths a year worldwide. The countdown to climatic change catastrophe is spelt out by a task force of senior politicians, business leaders and academics from around the world and it is remarkedly brief. In as little as 10 years, or even less, their report indicates, the point of no return with global warming may have been reached.

The main causes behind the catastrophic changes in the global climate are deforestation, indiscriminate cutting of trees, uncontrolled use of fossil fuels leading to depletion of natural resources besides causing large scale pollution thereby leading to global warming. There are various effects of Global warming ranging from melting of polar ice-caps and subsequent rise in sea level as well as loss of home of penguins to change in global climate leading to adverse impact on crops and aquatic life due to rise in water temperature.

The immediate major risks to humanity are identified as a global war triggered by competition over scarce resources, the catastrophic consequences of global warming; and international terrorism that could potentially develop into a nuclear conflict. Other dangerous risks include the persistence of extreme poverty and the widening of the great divide between extremely rich and poor, potentially leading to massive disturbances.

A 'reformist solution' to the existing structures is insufficient – the real solution lying in a people—oriented system that enables direct participation in the economic and political decisions that affect people's lives. Social programs must additionally ensure that everyone receives enough resources to have a decent standard of living. What is needed is not only a dialog among environmental experts, NGOs, and governments, but also the engagement of individuals around the world who are concerned about the potential global and local effects of climatic change. Only through broad participation and cooperation will we be able to find innovative solutions.

Your everyday actions have far reaching consequences. Every action of yours, right from switching on radio sets, music systems, microwave, etc. add to global warming.

Trust take a look:-

- Using an air conditioner (2.5 ton) for an hour generates 3 Kg of CO₂.
 But if you decide to go without AC for an hour a day, you can stop the release of 3 x 365 = 1095 kg of CO, per year.
- Using a geyser for an hour generates 3.3 kg of CO₂.
 If you cut down on your use of geyser by just one hour a day, you can stop the release of 3.3 x 365 = 1204.5 kg of CO₂ in the atmosphere per year.
- The estimated population of India on March 2008 was 1.13 billion.
 A single tree absorbs one ton of carbon dioxide during its lifetime.
 Even if each of us plant just one tree in our lifetime, we can eliminate 1.13 billion ton of CO, from the atmosphere.
- One dripping tap in a house = wastage of 13 litres of water in a single day.
 Wastage in a year = 13 litres x 365 = 4745 litres of water. □



In 1212 he allowed formation of an order for women, called the Poor Clares. In 1219 he went to Egypt, preached to the Sultan, and visited the holy places of Jerusalem. In 1224, after a vision, he became


the first person to receive the stigmata. His influence helped restore popular faith in a church much corrupted by wealth and political aspirations.

NSG-The Men in black

"It goes, strikes, achieves and quietly comes back just like the mythologial Chakra which would behead the demons and return to the finger of Lord Krishna", says Nikhil Kumar, former director-general of the National Security Guards (NSG), describing the elite anti-terror crack force.

The NSG proudly wears the mantle of being one of the finest counter-terrorist units in all of Asia. But being the finest unit does not come without a price. The NSG stimulates hundreds of realistic scenarios in daily drills-the key being rapidity and surprise. The unit is popularly known as the Black Cats, because of the black nomex coveralls and balaclavas (head gear) or assault helmets they adorn. Their motto is-One for All, All for One.

Their selection process is one of the most gruelling and the probation grind saps the toughest of recruits. Endurance tests involves unerring target shooting at the end of a strenuous obstacle ridden cross country run. This is meant to gauge the candidate's performance under conditions of stress and exhaustion. Those who complete this course are inducted into the NSG and given further training. Some

operators are sent to Israel for specialized training.

In 'combat room shoot' commandos have to enter in a dark room, adjust their vision to the darkness and shoot at a target-all within three seconds by a torchlight or a compatible laser image intensifier. Similar training is also conducted under discotheque strobe lights as well, which are some of the most difficult shots to

take. Commandos are trained to shoot in a double trap manner - one at the chest to halt the victim and second to club his skull open. Shooting skills are honed at an electronic combat shooting range, with a target exposure time of two to three seconds.

After completing their training, the commandos have to be on an 'alert status' mode for two months. During this period the target strike rate has to be above 85% for a commando to remain in the force. Practice is their key and the commandos have to go through the routine drill daily to keep themselves fighting fit and ready to move anywhere in the country within a notice of thirty minutes.

NSG personnel use weapons like the famed 9mm Uzi sub-machine gun. Their weapon of choice, however, is the Heckler & Koch family of 9mm sub-machine guns, the 7.62mm PSG-1 sniper weapon, Carl Gustav rocket launchers and the Heckler & Koch 512 12-gauge shotgun. Side arms include Glock 17 and Sig Sauer P226 9mm pistols. A commando also handles combat gadgets such as AK - 47/56/74s, Browning high power 9mm pistols, 5.56mm M16A2s and the locally manufactured 7.62 mm SLR and 5.56 mm INSAS rifles.

They are also armed with state-of-the-art surveillance gadgets and other sophisticated reconnaissance equipment. The unit is also parachute-trained and has a

superb bomb disposal squad.

The NSG is an elite force providing a second line of defence to the nation. The NSG has maintained an edge over terrorist outfits in possession of latest technology and training and are considered among the finest special operations units in all of South Asia. They are like nukes. The ultimate back-up.


Today Radium rays are used for treating cancer. Similarly, atomic rays will be used to relieve the pain and suffering of the people. No disease will remain incurable.

Glass Recycling

Glass recycling is both simple and beneficial. Let's start with the benefits of glass recycling. A glass bottle that is sent to a landfill can take up to a million years to break down. By contrast, it takes as little as 30 days for a recycled glass bottle to leave your kitchen recycling bin and appear on a store shelf as a new glass container. Glass containers are 100-percent recyclable, which means they can be recycled repeatedly, again and again, with no loss of purity or quality in the glass. Recovered glass from glass recycling is the primary ingredient in all new glass containers. A typical glass container is made



of as much as 70 percent recycled glass. According to industry estimates, 80 percent of all recycled glass eventually ends up as new glass containers. Every ton of glass that is recycled saves more than a ton of the raw materials needed to create new glass, including: 1,300 pounds of sand; 410 pounds of soda ash; and 380 pounds of limestone. Making new glass means heating sand and other substances to a temperature of 2,600 degrees Fahrenheit, which requires a lot of energy and creates a lot of industrial pollution. One of the first steps in glass recycling is to crush the glass and create a product called "cullet". Making recycled glass products from cullet consumes 40 percent less energy than making new glass from raw materials, because cullet melts at a much lower temperature. Because glass is made from natural materials such as sand and limestone, glass containers have a low rate of chemical interaction with their contents. As a result, glass can be safely reused. Besides serving as the primary ingredient in new glass containers, recycled glass also has many other commercial uses from creating decorative tiles and landscaping material to rebuilding eroded beaches; as I pointed out at the beginning of this article; it's simple because glass is one of the easiest materials to recycle. For one thing, glass is accepted by almost all curb side recycling programs and municipal recycling centres. What people have to do to recycle glass bottles and jars is to carry their recycling bin to the curb, or maybe drop off their empty glass containers at a nearby collection point. If you need an extra incentive to recycle glass, how about this: Several U.S. states offer cash refunds for most glass bottles, so in some areas glass recycling can actually put a little extra money in your pocket.



The United Nations celebrated it first in 1971. Since then most of the countries, including India, have been celebrating the event each year. This day is also significant because St. Francis of Assisi, probably the worlds first environmentalist, was born on this day.

Though environmental issues have come to light only in past few decades, concern for environment is nothing new in our country. Back in 1847 in the first recorded socioecological resistance movement in India, when the army of the King of Jodhpur started to log a forest, Bisnois of Jodhpur staged a non-violent protest, offering their bodies as shields for the trees. The King of Jodhpur was, as a result, forced to halt the logging and declare the region a reserve, off limits for logging and hunting.

Later a similar successful 'Chipko Andolan' a movement took place in the early 1970s in the Uttarakhand region of our country, spreading later to the entire country, resulting finally in more forest sensitive policies.



In our culture we consider earth as mother and regard her with a deep sense of reverence. The earth is the provider of all basic things needed to sustain life. It is the place man rises from and ultimately returns to by the end of his life. But with the rapid technological and industrial progress in our modern day lives, we seem to have lost the very basic values which were once an inherent part of our culture. Mahatma Gandhi had once remarked - "There is sufficiency in the world for man's need but not for man's greed." 

Nanotechnology & Nanobiotechnology



Manufactured products are made from atoms. The properties of those products depend on how those atoms are arranged. If we rearrange the atoms in coal we can make diamond. If we rearrange the atoms in sand (and add a few other trace elements) we can make computer chips. If we arrange atoms in dirt, water and air we can make potatoes.

Today manufacturing methods are very crude at molecular level. Casting, grinding, milling and even lithography move atoms in great thundering statistical herds.

It's worth pointing out that the word 'nanotechnology' has become very popular and is used to describe many types of research where characteristics dimensions are




less than about 1,000 nanometers. For example, continued improvements in lithography have resulted in line widths that are less than one micron: this work is often called "nanotechnology". Many of exponentially informing trends in computer hardware capability have remained steady for last 50 years. Nanotechnology will help us in building computer systems with mole quantities of logic elements that are molecular in both size and precision and

are interconnected in complex patterns. There are two more concepts commonly associated with nanotechnology: Positive assembly and massive parallelism.

Nanobiotechnology deals with the study and application of biological and biochemical activities from elements of nature to fabricate new devices like biosensors. Nanobiotechnology is often used to describe the overlapping multidisciplinary activities associated with biosensors particularly where photonics, chemistry, biology, biophysics, nanomedicine and engineering converge.

A Century in Turmoil

The great Albert Einstein once remarked — "I do not know how the third World War will be fought, but I can tell you what they will use in the Fourth rocks!"

Today, the world is facing a global catastrophe not just from the threat of the nuclear weapons but from all fronts, be it diplomatic, environmental or any other: everything is in a turmoil in the 21st century.


Terrorism is perhaps the greatest threat in the world as besides spreading terror, it is also responsible for degrading relations between nations. Take the example of India and Pakistan. The frequent attacks by Taliban on India has affected the diplomatic relations between the two countries. Both countries have been increasing their nuclear arsenal so that in the event of a war, none is overpowered by the other.

Environmental problems caused due to human activities also pose a great threat to the survival of mankind. Global warming is the increase in the average temperature of the Earth's near surface air and oceans and its projected continuation. Global surface temperature increased 0.74 ± 0.182 during the last century. Human activities are mainly responsible for global warming.

Global warming has serious impacts. The rising temperature of the earth causes the glaciers and ice caps to melt as a result of which, the sea level rises. This will result in the submergence of islands and low lying areas. Reports say that on an average, increase of 2°C is enough to melt the ice sheets. This will increase the sea level by sixteen to twenty feet.

Motorsports, which has continued to captivate and enthrall people for years is largely responsible for the depletion in the supplies of petroleum. In Formula One, perhaps the most prolific racing event in a year, approximately 3000 litres of petrol are spent in each race. That brings the total consumption in a season of eighteen races to approximately 54000 litres. Likewise many other such events are held that consume almost this much amount of fuel.

Environmental damage and war share a very close relationship. Today, nations are busy advancing their armoury and nuclear arsenal. Testing of fission bombs have a drastic



effect on the environment. The vast plethora of energy liberated and radioactivity caused at the blast site and in the surrounding areas renders it uninhabitable and useless.

Lazaris was quite right when he remarked, "Nothing changes until you do." This truth is miles deep and anything but simple. Today, people are either ignorant or they simply do not give a damn about the problems and concerns that may impede our own existence and our progeny's.

Today, we are at such a junction, that we must all be able to read the writing on the walls or else be prepared to face the heat.

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लोकतांत्रिक दायित्वों का निर्वाहन जवाद देही के अभाव में एक अभिशाप है।

"मुझे असीर करों, या मेरी जुबां काटो। मेरे ख्याल को बेडी पहना नहीं सकते।"

"लोकतांत्रिक दायित्वों का निर्वाहन जवाब देही के अभाव में एक अभिशाप है।" मैं इस वक्तत्त्व से पूर्णतः सहमत हूँ। परन्तु इस विषय पर विचार करने से पूर्व हमें यह जानना होगा कि लोकतंत्र क्या है? — लोकतंत्र—यानि लोगों द्वारा चुना गया तंत्र। क्योंकि मानव सदा से ही व्यवस्था प्रिय रहा है और यह व्यवस्था वह अपने विकास के लिए ही करता है। उसकी इस प्रवृत्ति के फलस्वरूप समाज और राज्य अस्तित्व में आये, राज्य सार्वसाम्य सत्ता सम्पन्न होकर अपनी जनता को अच्छी से अच्छी शासन व्यवस्था प्रदान करे। यह अच्छी शासन व्यवस्था तभी प्राप्त हो सकती है कि जब लोकतांत्रिक दायित्वों का सही प्रकार से निर्वाहन किया जाए तथा उनकी जवाब देही तथ की जाये। मुझे बहुत ही दु:ख के साथ कहना पड़ रहा है कि हमारे देश में लोकतांत्रिक दायित्वों के निर्वाहन की जवाबदेही का सर्वथा अभाव है।

अब मैं आपको इसके कुछ उदाहरण देता हूँ क्योंकि हमारे लोकतंत्र के तीन आधार स्तम्भ है (1) विधायिका (2) कार्यपालिका एवं (3) न्यायपालिका। लोकतंत्र का पहला स्तम्भ विधायिका है जो कानून बनाने का कार्य कस्ती है। लेकिन आज, हमारी विधायिका अपने लोकतांत्रिक दायित्वों का निर्वाहन किस प्रकार कर रही है? आज हमारी अशिक्षित जनता, दुबंल विपक्ष, संकीणं स्वार्थगत



लोकतंत्र के इस स्तम्म में दायित्व के निर्वाहन का सर्वथा अभाव है। महाराष्ट्र, गुजरात, उड़ीसा में विधायिका अपने दायित्वों का निर्वाहन किस प्रकार कर रही है, हम सब मली मांति देख रहे हैं। आज कार्यपालिका में भ्रष्टाचार शीर्ष पर व्याप्त है। किसी समय पर हमारे स्वर्गीय प्रधान मंत्री राजीव गाँधी ने कहा था कि एक रूपयें में से 17 पैसे ही गरीबों तक पहुँचते हैं। लेकिन वर्तमान में, इससे भी बुरे हालात हैं। आज, अधिकतर भारतीयों का इस व्यवस्था से विश्वास उठ चुका है और कुछ यही हाल न्यायपालिका का भी है जहाँ पर पैसे के बल पर फैसले करवाये जा रहे हैं, जहाँ एक गरीब धनंजय को तो फाँसी के तख्ते पर चढ़ा दिया जाता है परन्तु अपनी बी.एम.डबल्यू से एक करोड़पति किस प्रकार 6 गरीबों को कुचलकर अंतिम निद्रा में लीन कर देता है; क्या इसकी जवाब देही इस न्यायपालिका की नहीं बनती? क्या उत्तर प्रदेश तथा महाराष्ट्र में किसानों द्वारा की गयी आत्महत्याओं के लिए किसी की जवाब देही नहीं है? हमारे देश में, रोज कहीं न कही जिस प्रकार कानून का मज़ाक बनाया जा रहा है, क्या वह किसी की जवाबदेही हैं? हमारे देश में जिस प्रकार धर्म, जाति के नाम पर राजनीति हो रही है, क्या उसमें किसी की जवाबदेही नहीं हैं? एक छोटे से छोटे काम को करवाने के लिए जिस प्रकार के रवैये का सामना एक आम आदमी को करना पड़ता है, उसका जवाब कौन देगा? क्या कारण है कि हमारे देश में एक अभीर और अमीर होता जा रहा है और एक ग्रीब आत्महत्या करने को मजबूर है?

एक समय 'वह' था, कि एक रेल दुर्घंटना होने पर तत्कालीन रेल मंत्री लाल बहादुर शास्त्री अपने पद से इस्तीफा दे देते हैं 'और' एक समय 'यह' है, कि आतंकी हमला होने पर मीडिया के दवाब में आकर हमारे तत्कालीन गृह मंत्री शिवराज पाटिल इस्तीफा देने को 'मजबूर' होते हैं जिसका पर्दाफाश हमारे लोकतंत्र के चौथे स्तम्भ 'प्रेस' ने किया कि किस प्रकार कानून की घज्जियों उड़ाई गयीं। और यही चौथा स्तम्भ, जो कुछ हद तक अपने दायित्वों का निर्वाहन सही प्रकार से करता है, लेकिन उसकी एक गलती पर, 26/11 के हमले के बाद, गलत रिपोर्टिंग को आधार बनाकर उसके लिए नियम बना



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दिये जाते हैं। क्यों? क्योंकि यह चौथा स्तम्भ कुछ जवाब देही तय करना चाहता था जोकि एक आम आदमी नहीं कर सकता। क्या हम यह प्रश्न उठा सकते थे कि आखिर कैसे 60 घंटे बाद हमारी कार्यपालिका अपने दायित्वों का निर्वाहन सही प्रकार से कर पाई? क्या हम यह पूछ सकते थे कि तत्कालीन मुख्यमंत्री कैसे एक फिल्म निर्देशक को लोकेशन दिखाने ले गये? क्या 'इस' प्रकार हम अपने

दायित्वों का निर्वाहन करेंगे? लेकिन ये तो सिर्फ 'कुछ' उदाहरण हैं। जब तक इन दायित्वों की जवाबदेही तय नहीं होती, तब तक यह एक अभिशाप ही हैं।

जिस प्रकार मनुष्य पर समाज का नियंत्रण है, ऋतुओं पर काल का नियंत्रण है, बहती हुई नदियों पर तटों का नियंत्रण है, उसी प्रकार लोकतांत्रिक दायित्यों के निर्वाहन पर जवाब देही रूपी नियंत्रण होना ही चाहिए। इनका अमाव, एक ऐसे अभिशाप के समान होगा, जैसे यदि नदी पर तट रूपी नियंत्रण न होता है तो वह मैदानों में जाकर सूख जाती है और बाद में विनाश करके भैरव गर्जन करती हुई तबाही मचा देती हैं, जिस प्रकार बिना अंकुश के हाथी और अनुशासन रहित समाज विनाश की ओर जाता है, उसी प्रकार लोकतांत्रिक दायित्वों के निर्वाहन के अभाव में हमारा समाज भी एक अभिशप्त समाज है। और अंत में, अपनी लोकतांत्रिक व्यवस्था को देखते हुए मैं सिर्फ और सिर्फ यही कह सकता है:

"यह दागुदार उजाला, यह शबे गाज़ी का सहर। वो इंतज़ार था जिसका, यह वो सुबह तो नहीं!!" 🗖

शिक्षक - छात्रों के भविष्य निर्माता

"नरता का आदर्श तपस्या के भीतर पलता है, देता वही प्रकाश जगत को, जो अभीत जलता है।"

'जिस प्रकार एक दिए की ली स्वयं जलकर दूसरों को प्रकाश देती है, उसी प्रकार एक आदर्श शिक्षक वह है जो छात्रों को ज्ञानमयी बनाने के लिए स्वयं कठिनाइयों में रहने की क्षमता रखता है।'

विश्व का हर एक राष्ट्र योग्य और चारित्रिक अध्यापकों के निर्माण के प्रश्न को लेकर चिन्तित है क्योंकि शिक्षक ही तो छात्रों का मविष्य निर्माता है, शिक्षक वास्तव में देश और समाज का प्राण है। हमारा ये संसार अपने अज्ञानी बच्चों को शिक्षक पर सौंप देता है, शिक्षक ही तो है जो छात्रों के अज्ञान रूपी चक्षुओं को खोल कर उन्हें ज्ञान रूपी प्रकाश प्रदान करता है तथा उन्हें योग्य और चरित्रवान बनाता है। तभी छात्र उस शिक्षक को देवता के समान समझते है जो निःस्वार्थ भावना से रात दिन छात्रों के हित में कार्य करता है।



कक्षा में छात्रों को पाठ आसानी से समझ में आए, इसके लिए आवश्यक है कि शिक्षक छात्रों के सामने पाठ्य विषयों को इस प्रकार प्रस्तुत करे कि छात्र उसे सहज ही ग्रहण कर ले। वह विषय के प्रत्येक अंश पर सरलता के साथ प्रकाश डाले क्योंकि उन विषयों का छात्रों को कोई ज्ञान नहीं होता; वह उन विषयों को अच्छी तरह से तभी समझ सकते हैं, जब उसे धीरे—धीरे सरल शब्दों में समझाया जाए।

अवसर देखा जाता है कि छात्रों के न पढ़ने पर या गलती करने पर अगर शिक्षक उनको दण्ड देते हैं तो कोई भी छात्र उसे हृदय से स्वीकार नहीं करता; अर्थात्— वाह्य रूप से तो वह दण्ड ग्रहण कर लेते हैं परन्तु आन्तरिक रूप से वह दण्ड उनके लिए असहनीय होता है, ऐसी स्थिति में छात्र के संभलने की जगह, कुमार्ग पर जाने की संभावना ज्यादा रहती है। दण्ड, उद्दण्डता को प्रेरित करता है। कभी—कभी छात्र दण्ड की वजह से हीन भावना के शिकार हो जाते है उसका आभास प्रत्येक शिक्षक को होना चाहिए।

आपने यह सुना होगा कि कोई विद्यार्थी यदि एक्टर या फैशन डिज़ाइनर या फिर कोई ग्लैमर की दुनिया से जुड़ा हुआ व्यवसाय करने की चाह रखता है तो उसे; उसके माता—पिता कहते हैं—"नहीं, लोग क्या सोचेंगे? तुम्हें दर—दर की ठोकरें खानी पड़ेंगी, इससे अच्छा है कि तुम इंजीनियंरिंग कालेज में पड़कर अपना भविष्य उज्ज्वल करो।" अब यदि छात्र का कझान कैशन डिज़ाइनिंग में है तो वह डॉक्टरी या इंजीनियंरिंग कैसे पढ़ पाएगा और यदि पढ़ भी लिया तो सफलता क्रैसे प्राप्त करेगा?

कैरियर तो बच्चों को सँवारना है, तो फिर उसमें माता पिता का क्या फैसला? यह बात मैं मानता हूँ कि माता—पिता हमेशा हमारा भला सोचते हैं, परन्तु उन्होंने तो अपना कैरियर स्वयं बनाया तो हम क्यों नहीं, इसलिए मैं कहता हूँ 'सुनो सबकी; पर करो मन की' जो तुम्हें पसन्द आए तुम वह करो। यह मत सोचों कि मुझे अपने व्यवसाय में अत्यंत प्रयत्न करना है।

मैंने कुछ ही दिनों पूर्व लखनऊ विश्वविद्यालय में साइकोलोजी विभाग की अध्यक्षा डा. अर्चना का लेक्चर सुना था जिन्होंने बड़े ही प्रभावशाली ढंग से कैरियर चुनने में माता—पिता बच्चे एवं टीचर या गाईड का योगदान समझाया था, बड़ी ही कुशलता से वह इसी बात पर आ पहुँची कि कैरियर चुनने में तीन बातों का अवश्य ध्यान रखें।

- 1. उस कैरियर में, आप की रूचि हो।
- 2. आप केवल पैसा ही नहीं पर अपने आने वाले परिवार के लिए कार्य कर रहे है।
- 3. कुछ ऐसा करिये जिससे समाज को लाभ प्राप्त हो। 🗖
