Glorious History of St. Francis' College, Lucknow



St. Francis' College celebrates its completion of a hundred and twenty-two illustrious years and is preparing itself for the hundred and twenty-fifth year. To begin with the celebration a volleyball match was played between the staff and students. It has come a longway since its inception as St. Francis' School and orphanage in 1885. An era has passed since the time the parish priest of St. Joseph's Church (now better known as the Cathedral), Rev. Fr. Norbert, O.F.M. Cap; took a bold step and initiated Isaac and Charles Claudius, the first two pupils onto their scholastic journey. Education was then the preserve of the British, it was their responsibility and the early schools chiefly catered to them. The priest started this missionary work without any financial resources and no help was forthcoming from the government. He converted a portion of his bungalow on the south-east of the church ground into classrooms and a small thatched room that served as his kitchen and store into a dormitory. Originally the Priest House at Hazratganj was situated on the plot where the Cathedral School now stands. Mr. H.A. Cosgrove was the

first full time teacher. Mr. J.B.S. Boyle, a leading advocate at that time, was a generous patron of the school. The School's responsibility fell on Fr. Emmanuel Van den Bosch, a Belgian Capuchin, due to the untimely demise of Fr. Norbert in 1886. Initially a new building programme was necessitated due to the rapid enrolments. On Sunday, 4th May 1890 Fr. Bartholomew, O.F.M.Cap; laid the foundation stone of St. Francis' Boarding and Day School for boys. The cost of Rs. 5,094 was paid by the Bishop of Allahabad (Lucknow Diocese did not exist then), and some well wishers. In 1893, Fr. Bartholomew built the new priest house on the site where the Bishop's House, now stands released the old presbytery to the school and it served as the boys' dormitory. In 1894, Fr. Petronious Gramigna. O.F.M. Cap' who later on became -Bishop of Allahabad, secured the recognition of Middle School from the Department of Education. In 1908, the property of the present site of the school premises, an adjoining compound with a building in centre was purchased by Dr. Petronious Gramigna, the then Bishop of Allahabad on Shahnajaf Road.

Fr. Celestine, O.F.M. Cap., was appointed Principal on 1st June 1910. The building project on the site took time to take off due to delay release of the sanctioned amount by the European government. The





diocese pitched in with finances for the completion of the two imposing buildings on either side of the Bungalow which are now known as the Old Concert Hall and Gymnasium. The building contract was given to Messers P. Labanti and Company of Italy who despite the war year restrictions and high cost of building completed the building by January 1918. On 7th February 1918, H.E. Sir James Meston, Lt. Governor of U.P. paid a visit to the new school. In 1921, the school secured recognition as a High School and affiliated itself to the Cambridge University for the Senior Cambridge Examination. Memory's runway reveals several junctures, several milestones both in academic excellence and other building expansions- erection of refrectory, chapel and Infirmary (Present Principal's office and Staff Room). In 1975 the first batch of I.C.S.E. students took the Examination. Modifications in the structure were carried on from time to time. Just as St. Joseph's Cathedral is a prominent landmark of Hazratganj, St. Francis' College is the hallmark of educational excellence. Its two large playfields are always bursting with bubbling students who never tire of the school's environs; even during Sundays and holidays they do not want to return home but are coaxed to do so.

It evolved in a rich cultural milieu, the first twentyone Principals were all from the Order Die Minori

Cappuccini, Italy; all dedicated Capuchin Missionaries of the Bologna Province; Some breathed their last on the Indian soil; while some, like Rev. Fr. Lews of Casola, Rev. Fr. Cyril, Rev. Fr. Raphael De Souza spent three to three to four decades in ecclesiastical service in India. Rev Fr. Roamno, O.F.M. Cap, as Vice Principal and Principal (8 years) was the last Capuchin Missionary. In 1971 the school was handed over to the Diocesan Priests and Fr. Leo Lobo became the second Indian to become the Principal of St. Francis' School, the first being Fr. Raphael who was Principal from 1949 to 1952. The college has become

an emblem; a chronicled institution that had its first cover issued by the Chief Postmaster General on September 14, 2007, U.P. Circle, Lucknow. St. Francis' College is an epitome of Lucknow's rich heritage and it spearheaded the much needed educational evolution which is essential for development and self-reliance of a nation. Educational institutes like these contribute to India's ascendancy on the international front, St. Francis' College is one of the premiere institutes of our country.

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Science, Art and Philosophy

In the world, today, we find several heated arguments over what science, art and philosophy actually are. People mistakenly assume that science is for the intellectual, art for the creative and philosophy the politically—oriented. Yet such sterotypes keep us in the dark and prevent us from realising that a successful person needs a part of all the three to progress; ignorance of any aspect shall impede success.

First of all, I will discuss science, a term that many people regard with undue contempt. The English word 'science' is, derived from the Latin word 'scientia' which means to have knowledge. Science is the systematic knowledge and study of proven facts. That apple falls to the ground when detached from an apple tree is science, but to say that tea tastes better than coffee is not. The former observation is based on the proven concept of gravity while the latter is just a case of personal opinion.

Now let us consider what is art. Art is any skill that is either innate or acquired through study, experience or observation. It is not necessary for the art to be restricted to any particular form. This fact, once a philosophy, laid the foundation of the science of Chemistry. Similarly, it comes as no surprise that Issac Newton's groundbreaking book was titled 'Philosophae Naturalis Principia Mathematica', which translates to the 'Natural Philosophy of Mathematical Principles.'

To conclude, I may state that Science, Art and Philosophy are not three distinct entities but rather parts of our perception of the world around us. To try to seagregate them is futile, but to be able to use them all, together, will certainly make a person great.

The Stars of Yuksam-A Short Story

It was the last day of school for the term. Ten year old Niraj was excited as he was going to his home to spend a month with his grandparents. But just before he thought it was going to be a perfect holiday, he heard the teacher utter the words 'holiday homework'. "There it goes, "he grumbled," my perfect holiday! Now I'm going to have to sit doing this instead of spending time listening to grandpa's stories about the birds and animals, like the tragopans and the Red Pandas that he encountered during his many treks on Mount Khangchendzonga."

However, the topic of the essay that he was supposed to write lifted his spirit a little. 'Heroes of our land', he said to himself, while his mind was racing through the number of story books he had read. Anyway, he would have to think of this later as he had to rush back home. His dad would drive them to their home in Yuksam, in his jeep. At 5,800 ft above sea level, Yuksam was nestled at the foot of the mountains. Through Yuksam flows the glorious Rathong river, considered sacred by the Buddhists of Sikkim, as it has 109 lakes which are the abode of local deities.

The drive from Siliguri to Yuksam took five hours. In the jeep, Niraj could never doze off like his mom did. Instead, he would watch his dad smoothly manoeuvre the sharp bends of the road. And as they got past bend after bend, the mighty Rathong Chu (Chu means river in Sikkimese), would appear and disappear from their sight. His thought went back to his homework. "Who's your hero, papa?" he turned in his seat to face his dad.

The question set Gyaltsen thinking. He thought of Sonam and Chukie and Pema and many others who had worked night and day to save Yuksam from a very destructive plan. They were all heroes, he thought. In our sacred land of the Rathong Chu, every person is a hero and blessed by the deity who lives on Mount Khangchendzonga. He said. "Let me tell you a story of what happened in our village and then you'll know that what I say is true."



"On an unusual warm day in the summer of 1993, some of us were sitting at the entrance of the village. We saw a truck full of cement bags and digging implements coming towards us. The truck driver told us that some people, who stayed far away and had never visited our village or seen our glorious Rathong Chu, had decided to build a huge wall across the river. Their idea was to stop the river from flowing and make electricity from that water. For days after that, my friends and I sat arguing and wondering. It would be good if all the homes in the village could be lit up by that electricity, but what would the construction do to our village and our Rathong Chu?"

Over the next few days, this was the only matter that was discussed in all the families in Yuksam. Some of the elders decided that this matter was important enough to be discussed and so everyone sat in the shade of the huge willow tree in the centre of the village. Lamas from the nearby gompas (monastery) had also walked to Yuksam for the meeting. And there, the lamas, together with our elders, made us







realise that Yuksam was too special a place to be sacrificed for anything. The Noysol, our sacred book, says that the soil on which we live is blessed by Guru Rinpoche. Our sacred deities lived in these rocks, hills, trees, and lakes right here, explained one of the frail old lamas. If we allow this construction in the village, the trees along Rathong Chu will be cut down and the rocks will be broken up to build the wall. The birds and the butterflies, whom we share this land with, will fly far away and our deities will leave, too. We will never be happy after that." He said in a low, sad voice. Niraj, who was following this story with rapt attention quickly added, "Grandpa did tell me last year that some people had once tried to dump mud into the Kathok lake. Did nobody ever tell them that grandpa and so many others prayed to the deity at the lake?" "Yes, it was all part of the same construction plan." said Gyalsten, "and nobody bothered to ask us before doing it! Do you also remember the Burn Chu ritual that grandpa took you to last year?"

"Of course," said Niraj. "He let me sit on his shoulder so that I would get a full view of the huge number of people who had gathered at our monastery. Everyone wanted to drink a drop of water from the special vase."

"The vase contains holy water. Every year the vase is opened and a cup of pure water from the Rathong Chu is added." explained Gyaltsen.

But are the woods really that lovely for us?

The above lines are very familiar to our ears and quote lines from Robert Frost's beautiful poem titled "Stopping by woods on a snowy evening". Ever thought why were we made to learn these lines during our school days? So that we can quote them in our essays?! These lines have a very deep meaning as deep as the woods Frost was travelling through. Certainly the woods aren't the literal woods and the man isn't a wood-cutter or a hunter! The 'dark woods' here is meant to symbolize the world around us and the miles to be travelled are the achievements and the recognition we aim to receive through our lives. But how often in India do we actually plunge into our choice of the deep dark woods?



From the first time we choose our stream of subjects in our schools to selecting our graduation fields in college our decisions are biased by the world around. In other words, our mind overpowers our heart and our heart is too weak to take the fight! After all, it becomes a matter of earning and living and not what it should be like, i.e. LIVING and then earning. To all the working class people I want to put up this question—are they content with their profession? Is that what they had always wanted to be? Didn't they ever compromise with their desire and will?

While choosing our livelihood don't we end-up making

a choice between our interest and our family's expectation? The problem is seen more in families where the profession is not actually chosen but it is a family tradition, for example litigation, business, medicine etc. There isn't any choice to make. Moreover, in India, where it's about the culture and the moral values you have to choose your family's hope (and regard it as superior always!) your own dreams for yourself. But is this how it should be? Obviously not!

Till only a decade ago this trend seemed appropriate because we either had no or a few options to pick from; when education was a status symbol. But as our nation aims to be a super-power we see the options are growing (though they are still under grown)

To talk about 2 or 3 decades back, when India was recuperating the losses incurred due to the British rule, it could well be justified that the students had little choice to make. There weren't as many institutes with as many courses to offer. So even if a person had the guts to stand tall against the niche, he or she ended up being with the crowd. Adding to this fact were few more facts. Firstly, people didn't have enough knowledge about various career options (except engineering, medicine, law etc.) Though they recognised people with talents like dancing, singing, painting, etc. as blessed, but these 'talents' were not supposed to be a profession. Had Raju Srivastava done 30 years back what he is doing now (and is famous for) he would have been called eccentric (and things). Who would have imagined that stand-up comedy could earn you lakhs of rupees? Secondly, they didn't have enough money to let the gambling go on.





Coming back to the present, the idea has changed, but only negligibly. A doctor would still like his son to be a doctor, his daughter to be happily married to a doctor and his wife to be a proud home-maker of a doctor's family (his!). And same is true for an engineer or a lawyer and so on. We are made to think on the lines of social security and financial stability—but where did the mental contentment go? Is it not needed for a happy living? Or is it just a matter of living in the end and not "being alive"?

So even if a farmer's son has to end up with farming today, he can still go to some agricultural institute, learn about the advances and latest techniques in that field, come back to the lush-green farming area and earn his living (if he actually wills to do that!). But on the contrary, we get to see examples of a farmer selling his farm to gather money, so that he can finance his son's B.Tech. or MBBS degree! Unfortunately enough, the major population in villages is uneducated and it doesn't even know that degrees apart from these also exist! For them, their child must be either a "doctor sahib" or an "Engineer babu". Where did the fact that Indian economy is largely supported by agriculture, go?

In a country like ours, courses like agricultural engineering, rural management, bio-technology are a need of the hour. But people hardly notice that! The recent damage to our country's agricultural production due to drought could have been minimized if we had better educated people to study that and find a more scientific solution to that. If only we had more Kiran Majumdar Shaws and her like! It is really appreciable that she took the risk to be the founder of Biocon-India and how she helped the company grow to its current position.

And when we are talking about risk takers, education and trend setters, I desire to put forth a name which is worshiped by youth in our country — Sachin Tendulkar! Here is the best example of someone who believes in himself and his abilities. He never cared about getting a professional degree (or even completing his schooling), but the heights he achieved aren't a matter of luck or chance. It takes a great deal of patience and hard work. His success is also supported by the fact that the Indian government has started looking into this direction.

So why don't we care to have more of Sachin Tendulkars? And what should concern us more is the fact that very few children take up sports as their career! Even though Indian names flash our television screens during sports news but is it enough for a nation with a billion plus population?

Indian parents are definitely prejudiced about sports as a career. And those who are willing to let their children take the risk (may be because they themselves aren't content with their job) seldom find good institutes with a good trainer. The very few academies that we have in India don't have the state-of-the-art facility that is needed (except for cricket, and lately tennis!). Thus the children are 'made to' lack the motivation in this regard. Hence, sports remains to be less picked up and courses like B.P. Ed remain to be hardly known to our people.

Not only sports, but also various other courses are still not known by majority. As an example let us consider painting. The first thing that hits our brain when we hear that word is "ohh, painting is a good hobby". Not even 1/8th of the students in technical institutions are enrolled for courses like B.FA.






Strength of Humility

The "Jugaad" principle: Is this uniquely Indian concept an impediment to India's growth?

The Oxford dictionary defines "jugaad" as an "innovative fix" for various problems, Jugaad is probably our most precious resource. In India jugaad is a way of life. We apply this principle every day and everywhere. Many years ago, some innovative poor farmers in Punjab mounted a diesel irrigation pump on a steel frame with wheels; creating a vehicle they called "jugaad." This worked as a small tractor and also functioned as a truck. It was very-cheap but did not conform to vehicular regulations. It was not made in sophisticated workshops but was made locally by semi-literate people. Overtime, jugaad came to mean grass root innovation to overcome any obstacle. For example, if a costly equipment stops functioning, you call the engineer from an authorized workshop. This engineer who is trained by the manufacturer will in all likely hood advice the change of a particular component that is mal-functioning. Now, if you call a local 'nearby' technician, he will most likely see the component, put some "jugaad" into it and will make the machine functional.



In western countries, innovation is done by scientists using expensive equipment and costly infrastructure. But, in India it is done by every housewife, farmer, transporter, mechanic etc. It does not require expensive R&D; it simply needs creativity and imagination. One avatar of jugaad is what management guns call "Frugal engineering", exemplified in the Tata Nano, the cheapest car in the world. This car has applied the unique Indian concept of jugaad to its fullest. Doctors in India use jugaad in treating patients especially in surgery. While the cost of treatment is very

high in western countries, in India it is very cheap creating full industry called medical tourism. Today, Narayana Hrudayalaya and Shankara Nethralaya provide the cheapest heart and eye treatment in the world. Similarly the drugs (medicines) in India are very cheap thanks to Indian reverse engineering of various patented drugs. Some management experts warn that jugaad uses any means, legal or illegal, to get a job done. In fact, sometimes, jugaad is used for bribing and for manipulation. This is wrong. Similarly, people get used to developing 'short-cuts' in everything that may be harmful in the long run. They forget the concept of hard work and want to finish the job using the jugaad principle.

In my opinion jugaad is India's most precious resource. However, it should not become a way of life.






